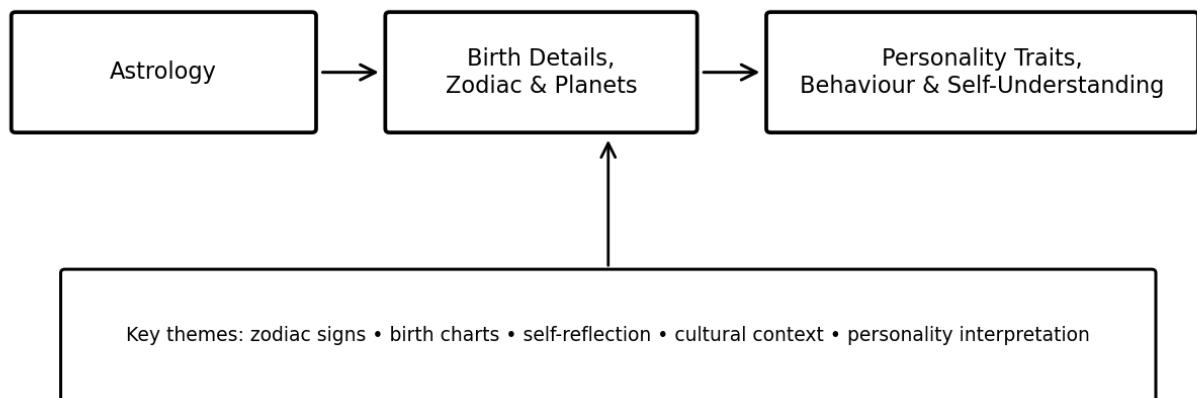


Figure 1. Conceptual framework showing the role of astrology in understanding human personality and behaviour.
